**Q:**

Besides reducing the overpopulation of unwanted animals, what are the health effects of spay or neuter on my cats and dogs?  
~Ann Rogers

**A:**

"I'm glad you asked because people don't realize the tremendous health benefits of sterilizing their pets! It's been estimated that a dog's lifespan can be increased 1-3 years and a cat's, 3-5 years and their lives will be healthier.

For females, spaying decreases or eliminates the risk of mammary tumors, uterine or ovarian cancers, and the life-threatening uterine infection called pyometra. In fact, a cat that's not spayed has a 90% chance of developing fatal mammary cancer.

For male pets, neutering decreases or eliminates the risks of fatal rectal cancer, testicular cancer and prostate disease.

For both sexes, undesirable behaviors are reduced or eliminated, such as marking or spraying in males, and heat cycles in females. Your pet's personality won't change with the exception of an aggressive dog possibly becoming less so. Altered pets have less tendency to roam, which prevents accidents, injuries, fights with others, digging / escaping behaviors, and lost pets."

Q:

What are heartworms and do I really need to give heartworm preventative to my dogs?

A:

Florida is a tropical paradise with a year round warm climate. It is a great setting for people looking to get away from shoveling snow but also an excellent environment for insects like mosquitoes. Most of us consider mosquitoes as a minor nuisance but they also carry a parasite called *Dirofilaria Immitis*, also known as heartworms.

It only takes a single bite from one mosquito to transmit immature heartworms into the blood of a dog or cat. These “baby” heartworms travel through the blood and set up shop in the blood vessels between the heart and lungs. They then go on to grow into spaghetti sized adult worms that cause significant damage to these vital organs. Dogs can carry a large number of these parasites before they start to show signs of disease. Signs of heartworm infestation include coughing, getting tired easily, and sudden collapse. In dogs, significant infestations lead to heart failure and death. While cats are less likely to carry a large number of worms, they can develop serious respiratory problems similar to asthma just by being exposed to the immature worms.

The treatment for adult heartworm infestation in dogs is a long and expensive process. While most dogs tolerate the treatment just fine, some can have serious side effects that prevent us from completing the treatment process. There is no safe treatment for adult heartworm infestation in cats. The good news is there are now many safe and effective options for the prevention of these parasites in our pets. These options include flavored chewable tablets, topical treatments, and even an injection for dogs that protects them for 6 months! These preventions are by prescription only, so you will need to get them directly from your veterinarian



or veterinary pharmacy. This is definitely a situation where an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure! Speak to your veterinarian today to make sure your pet is protected from this deadly parasite!

Have you fed or picked up a stray cat or dog, adopted from a shelter or rescue group, donated, fostered, volunteered, advocated, networked, or fundraised to help animals? 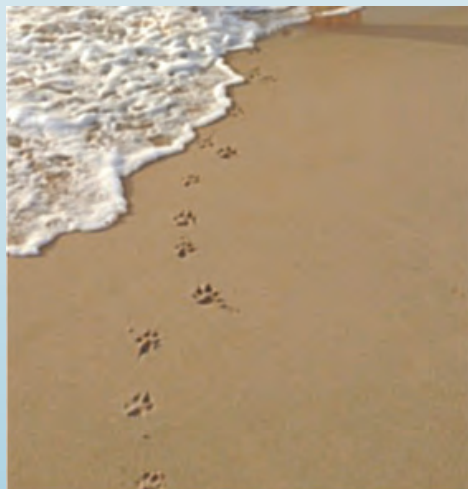
Rescue and shelter workers are reminded each day of the sad statistics:

- Nearly 3 Million dogs and cats are euthanized in shelters each year nationwide
- Approximately 33% of dogs and 41% of cats entering shelters nationwide are euthanized
- Up to 50 animals are taken in per day at Palm Beach Animal Care and Control
- Only 29% of the 150 million cats and dogs with homes were adopted from rescue groups or shelters

It's an overwhelming problem and one that weighs heavily on the hearts of those who care so deeply. Most people 'tsk tsk' and feel sad for a moment but others roll up their sleeves and get busy being part of the solution.

Quietly, behind the scenes and without recognition, legions of amazing people are making a difference in ways large and small. They are the unsung heroes whose only 'thanks' comes in a wet, sloppy kiss, the tiniest tail wag of a frightened dog who's learning to trust again, or the feeling of knowing they've donated or helped a pet in some way along its journey. And that is enough to keep them going when their hearts get heavy.

It's easy to wonder how small efforts can ever help curb the problems we face in rescue. It's easy to be discouraged as you hold a trembling, sick or injured animal in your arms and know how many more there are.



It's devastating to know that an animal you could not save has been lost. It's sad to see the faces in need on your social media feed. It's hard to imagine how your few hours of volunteering or your small monetary donation can make a dent.

And then, right in the middle of feeling overwhelmed....THERE IT IS....the moment your despair is erased as you watch a rescued dog go to a loving home, and it's magical. You, yes YOU.... CAN make a difference, one animal at a time.

Every animal rescuer or advocate, every shelter worker, every person who donates, fosters, networks, adopts, spays or neuters or volunteers should remember this story when the going gets tough. It's been rewritten in many forms but was originally written by Loren Eiseley, an anthropologist:

\*One day a man was walking along a beach as the sun was rising on the day. As he walked along the shore, he noticed a

small figure up ahead. As he got closer, he realized it was a small boy who was picking up objects from the sand and throwing them into the sea. As he approached he said to the boy, “What are you doing?”. The boy replied, “Throwing starfish into the ocean”. “But why?” asked the astounded man. “Because the sun is coming up and they are stranded on the beach. The tide has gone out and if I don't help them, they will die”. The man thought for a moment as he looked up and down the vast stretch of beach covered with hundreds of starfish. “Young man, don't you realize there are miles and miles of beach and starfish along every mile? You can't possibly make a difference!” At this, the boy bent down to pick up yet another starfish, walked to the water's edge and threw it in. “Made a difference to THAT one”, he said.\*

So to those who make a difference, WE SALUTE YOU! Thank you from the bottom of every rescued animal's heart.

If you'd like to join the fight to save the lives of homeless, abandoned, abused animals, here are ways you can help:



- **ADOPT**, don't buy! Purchasing a dog feeds the demand for more to be produced. Adopt from a rescue group or shelter or from a breed-specific rescue organization. Adopted dogs ROCK and will be forever grateful!

- **SPAY / NEUTER / TAG / MICROCHIP** your pets. This will vastly cut down on the number of animals who find themselves homeless or lost and in need of rescue to survive.

- **FOSTER.** Check with local rescue organizations who always need foster homes. The more fosters they have, the more pets they can save. All expenses are covered and it's a short term commitment.

- **DONATE.** Rescue organizations and private shelters can save more animals when they raise more funds. It's still all about the bottom line. Along with monetary donations, they also appreciate items they need most. Ask what they need....it may be a service you can provide or something as simple as rounding up old towels and blankets to donate.

- **VOLUNTEER.** Whether it's actual work with the animals or

joining a fundraising team, stuffing envelopes or planning events, rescue groups need you and your amazing talents!

- **ADVOCATE.** Become involved in animal legislation by writing to representatives and being the voice of helpless animals.

- **SHARE / NETWORK.** Social media is a great service to homeless pets. Share the events, articles and pleas of rescue groups and shelters. Create awareness. Your share may be the one that saves a life!

Pick up that starfish! Every little action you take is important!

# BEWARE THESE WINTER PET HAZARDS

Ah, It's a great time of the year, isn't it? Cooler, crisper Florida air and oh all those wonderful upcoming holidays to celebrate with family and friends, including the furry ones!

But winter and its holidays present specific hazards for your beloved pets, so take a look at this list to learn (or refresh your memory) how you can keep your dogs and cats from danger.

Then CELEBRATE and ENJOY safely!

- **EMERGENCY HOTLINE.** Right now, save this number for the ASPCA Pet Toxin/Poison Emergency Hotline and program it into your cell phone. **(888) 426-4435.**

- **CHOCOLATE.** Yes even baking chocolate and all things chocolate are toxic to your pets.

- **ALCOHOL,** no fun for pets. Beware of guests setting drinks down where pets can reach them and no rum cake either!

- **MACADAMIA NUTS/ WALNUTS.** Nope, never. Often found in holiday baked goods.

- **UNBAKED BREAD DOUGH** is super dangerous.

- **FATTY FOODS.** Yep, they're yummy and we'll eat more of them around the holidays, but feeding them to your pets can cause serious illness such as pancreatitis besides making them overweight. Resist the sad face.

Tough love is better than a very ill pet.

- **RAISINS, GRAPES, CURRANTS** used in baking, such as fruitcakes. Nada. These are poison to dogs and cats.

- **CAFFEINE,** in any form, so beware even fancy coffee bean gifts tucked under the tree where pets can reach them.

- **XYLITOL,** the artificial sweetener, lurking in all the sugar-free treats and gum, is toxic to pets. Keep out of your pets' reach! Watch out for purse-divers.

- **TURKEY BONES.** Any bone presents risks, sorry.

- **SUGARY FOODS.** Just don't.

- **ONIONS/ GARLIC.** Ah so good, but toxic to animals.

- **FRUIT PITS OR SEEDS.** Toxic. No Bueno.

• **MEDICATIONS.** Your own, or those belonging to your guests, must be kept safely away. Remember when guests unpack suitcases and leave them open, medications may be available for sampling by your pets.

• **RIBBONS / TINSEL** have sharp edges and can also wrap around intestines or ball up if ingested.

• **ELECTRIC CORDS.** No chewing!

• **PLANTS.** When in doubt, be safe. Definite hazards are poinsettias, mistletoe and holly.

• **MARIJUANA.** Not cool and very dangerous if ingested by pets.

• **BATTERIES.** Believe it or not, some dogs and cats will chew on these. Harmful!

• **FERTILIZERS,** as in Christmas tree water.

• **ANCHOR YOUR HOLIDAY TREE** so that when your pets climb it or chase each other through the room in celebration, it will stay standing.

• **CANDLES.** Menorahs, or any unattended candles (think FIRE).

• **NOISE.** We humans love noise with our celebrations. Best to secure your pets in a safe room if there will be loud music or (UH OH) fireworks (New Year's Eve?), which scare pets who don't understand the noise AND fire!

• **TAG AND MICROCHIP** your pets if they aren't already. Winter holidays mean doors opening and closing, creating escape hazards. Get it done now.

Lastly, it's not usually a good idea to give a new pet as a gift unless you know the person wants and is ready to care for an animal. Too many pets wind up in shelters in the months after holidays...don't contribute to that chance. A better idea might be a "gift certificate" for an adoption fee in the future, once festivities calm down and the lucky addition can be carefully chosen and given proper care and time.

# RESCUE 101 *for* ROOKIES



## HOW TO ADOPT THE PET THAT'S RIGHT FOR YOU



Congratulations on choosing to ADOPT a homeless pet into your heart and home! You're a wonderful, caring person helping to curb the overflow of unloved animals and you'll be rewarded with years of love and gratitude from your rescued pet. Now, what's your plan?

Let's face it... in the end, your new pet will choose YOU! Chances are, all the forethought in the world will go out the window when you find that one furry face that makes your heart do that \*fluttery thing\* it does when it's falling in love!

That being said, you have a responsibility to find just the right pet to love for its entire life. The good news is that you can greatly improve your chances of a happy union with just a little bit

of thought and planning before you start searching.

Your first decision is...cat or dog? You probably already know which way you lean on this one and both make wonderful, loving companions. Consider your lifestyle and the amount of time and energy you have to spend with your new pet. Dogs generally require more of both.



If you're choosing a feline, kittens are fun but also remember that you may get a better sense of a cat's real personality once it's a bit older. You'll be able to choose between the one that winds its body around your ankles and follows you everywhere or the one that's more independent. Additionally, adult cats have a harder time finding homes than kittens and black cats of all ages are adopted less often so keep your heart open to these at-risk populations, too.

If your new family member will be a dog, there is much to consider. Finding the right fit is important and you want to make a fur-ever commitment so consider these points when choosing your newbie:

- Consider your home. Do you have a yard? A secure fence? Are you in a condo or apartment? Be sure condo associations, homeowner associations or landlords don't have any laws or restrictions on the size, types or number of pets you can have. Consider the size and activity level of the dog you can handle in the space you've got.
- Consider your family members and picture the dog that will fit in, especially if you have other pets, babies, toddlers or elders living with you. Size and activity level should match the people who will live with and care for the new pet.
- Consider the time you (or someone) will be at home. Are you gone for long periods of time each day? If so, an adult or even a precious senior dog may be a better fit for you than a puppy who needs training and lots of exercise. Many adoptable dogs are a bit older, a bit wiser, with better manners already in place. Don't overlook them and the benefits they offer.
- Consider your lifestyle, too. Do you envision a dog who will be a couch potato or one who'll be your new running partner?

- Consider a wonderful mutt or know the characteristics of a breed you may like. Mutts are unique and awesome blends of breeds! If you're set on a purebred, research the breed traits to be sure they fit your lifestyle and then find your adoptee by googling for a breed-specific rescue group in your area or search at [petfinder.com](http://petfinder.com) by breed.

- Ask questions of the volunteers, fosters or rescue workers who know a dog you have your eye on. Bring all family members along and spend as much time as you need to with the dog to get to know it and to know it's THE ONE. Try not to be impulsive with this long-term decision.

***\*AHHH and yet after you've read all this, we're back to the second paragraph of this article....you and your new family member will choose each other based on a connection of your hearts! That face, that lick, those sad or hopeful or happy or loving eyes will all work their magic and everything you've read here and your carefully thought-out 'plan' may be forgotten..... and sometimes, that's ok! Some of the best matches are truly made with the heart, after all!***



# A HEART FOR RESCUE

## OUR COVER COUPLE

### Kim and Gregory Tendrich



It's easy to be impressed by our dynamic cover couple, Kim and Gregory Tendrich. They're esteemed attorneys involved in seemingly every facet of Palm Beach County life and if you're lucky enough to chat with them for a few minutes you may learn that one of their strongest private passions is animal rescue. This duo and their two daughters all have a heart for pets in need and they walk the walk, beginning with a home full of 'grateful paws' including Cooper, their canine Hurricane Katrina survivor and adoptee.

When Hurricane Katrina slammed into the Gulf Coast in 2005 it brought flooding, devastation, and casualties. Among those displaced and homeless were tens of thousands of animals, including a young Labrador mix in Mississippi. The canine landed in a vastly overcrowded, chaotic Animal Control shelter where he waited, unclaimed and at risk. He was then rescued by a team from Boca Raton's TriCounty Animal Rescue, which traveled to Mississippi to collect some of the animals lost in the devastating hurricane and bring them into the safety of their no-kill shelter. This handsome dog was given the name "Copper" and over the next many months he was adopted out twice but returned to TriCounty for 'barking' or being 'too active'. So 15 months after Katrina, this boy was still waiting for a forever home after having been bounced around and experiencing more misfortune than any dog should.

Then a volunteer at TriCounty who's a family friend of the Tendrich's sensed a perfect fit and sent Kim this sweet dog's story and photo. When the family went to meet Copper the very next day, all of their lives instantly changed for the better!

"We knew he was right for us," said Gregory. "His gentle demeanor, wet nose, and tired, almost sorrowful gaze that day will never be forgotten."

Well, it could be argued that the sorrowful part has been forgotten by Copper, who's now the very happy, carefree "Cooper". You see, the Tendrich family thought he deserved a fresh start with a new name after his adoption and the one letter change seemed right. Now this good boy lives the good life in Boynton Beach! Cooper has spent the last 10 years with his active family...playing, fetching, swimming and running while being incredibly loved and cared for. He's a joyful, fun, loving and very LUCKY canine!

Kim says, "Cooper acclimated to our family very quickly and behaves as though he's truly grateful to us for having rescued him. He's an amazing dog who's brought love and laughter to our family and he's confirmed that there are so many great pets out there that just need a home and a chance."

Cooper gently and patiently shares the Tendrich home with multiple rescued cats whom Kim is also

passionate about. Besides those who've "officially become Tendrich's"; there are also about 150 feral cats that Kim feeds regularly at 10 different locations in the county. Usually after work, often in the dark or the rain, Kim shows up because they count on her for regular meals. Many have been hauled in for the all-important spay and neuter surgeries which Kim happily takes on as well, knowing that curbing the flow of litters is the key to solving the overpopulation and suffering of homeless animals. Oh and if you see a woman stop her car in traffic, then stop traffic to run out and rescue a dog or cat running in the roadway, that just might be Kim, too. This family's heart for rescue never rests!

As the Tendrich's tuck in each night with Cooper, now 12 years old, and their purr-fect rescued felines, they just know these animals are grateful. Gregory says, "They look into our eyes and we feel they're saying 'Thank you...I'm so happy to be home...'"
